1. Judges 9:22-24: An Evil Spirit

Abimelech's Punishment HCSB

²² When Abimelech had ruled over Israel three years, ²³ God sent an evil spirit between Abimelech and the lords of Shechem. They treated Abimelech deceitfully, ²⁴ so that the crime against the 70 sons of Jerubbaal might come to justice and their blood would be avenged on their brother Abimelech, who killed them, and on the lords of Shechem, who had helped him kill his brothers.

Will God ever use evil to accomplish His will?



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BACKSTORY: Judgment Cycle:

Judges 6:1-6

The Israelites did what was evil in the sight of the Lord. So the Lord **handed them over** to Midian seven years, ² and they oppressed Israel. Because of Midian, the Israelites made hiding places for themselves in the mountains, caves, and strongholds. ³ Whenever the Israelites planted crops, the Midianites, Amalekites, and the Qedemites came and attacked them. ⁴ They encamped against them and destroyed the produce of the land, even as far as Gaza. They left nothing for Israel to eat, as well as no sheep, ox or donkey. ⁵ For the Midianites came with their cattle and their tents like a great swarm of locusts. They and their camels were without number, and they entered the land to waste it. ⁶ So Israel became poverty-stricken because of Midian, and the Israelites cried out to the Lord.

Judgment Cycle:

- God provides and instructs how to live inside His Kingdom principles(Supernatural Laws).
- Man does for a time and then gets wonky and invites other things into his kingdom (Kingdom of freewill).
- Man gets beat up within the Enemy's kingdom (earth life) because he has stepped outside of God's Laws and is now receiving the repercussions of living outside of God's principles.
- Man cries out to God for help.
- God answers.

Judges 6:7-10

⁷ When the Israelites cried out to Him because of Midian, ⁸ the Lord sent a prophet to them. He said to them, "This is what the Lord God of Israel says: 'I brought you out of Egypt and out of the place of slavery. ⁹ I delivered you from the power of Egypt and the power of all who oppressed you. I drove them out before you and gave you their land. ¹⁰ I said to you: I am Yahweh your God. Do not fear the gods of the Amorites whose land you live in. But you did not obey Me."

• Strong leader was God's answer this time. Strong leader from an unusual place.

Judges 6:11-24 The Lord Calls Gideon

- ¹¹ The Angel^[a] of the Lord came, and He^[b] sat under the oak that was in Ophrah, which belonged to Joash, the Abiezrite. His son Gideon was threshing wheat in the wine vat in order to hide it from the Midianites. ¹² Then the Angel of the Lord appeared to him and said: "The Lord is with you, mighty warrior."
- ¹³ Gideon said to Him, "Please Sir, [a] if the Lord is with us, why has all this happened? [d] And where are all His wonders that our fathers told us about? They said, 'Hasn't the Lord brought us out of Egypt?' But now the Lord has abandoned us and handed us over to Midian."
- ¹⁴ The Lord turned to him and said, "Go in the strength you have and deliver Israel from the power of Midian. Am I not sending you?"

¹⁵ He said to Him, "Please, Lord, how can I deliver Israel? Look, my family is the weakest in Manasseh, and I am the youngest in my father's house."

- ¹⁶ "But I will be with you," the Lord said to him. "You will strike Midian down as if it were one man."
- ¹⁷ Then he said to Him, "If I have found favor in Your sight, give me a sign that You are speaking with me. ¹⁸ Please do not leave this place until I return to You. Let me bring my gift and set it before You."

 And He said, "I will stay until you return."

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¹⁹ So Gideon went and prepared a young goat and unleavened bread from a half bushel^[] of flour. He placed the meat in a basket and the broth in a pot. He brought them out and offered them to Him under the oak.

²⁰ The Angel of God said to him, "Take the meat with the unleavened bread, put it on this stone, and pour the broth on it." And he did so.

²¹ The Angel of the Lord extended the tip of the staff that was in His hand and touched the meat and the unleavened bread. Fire came up from the rock and consumed the meat and the unleavened bread. Then the Angel of the Lord vanished from his sight.

²² When Gideon realized that He was the Angel of the Lord, he said, "Oh no, Lord God! I have seen the Angel of the Lord face to face!"

²³ But the Lord said to him, "Peace to you. Don't be afraid, for you will not die." ²⁴ So Gideon built an altar to the Lord there and called it Yahweh Shalom. ^[g] It is in Ophrah of the Abiezrites until today.

Judges 6:25-40

Gideon Tears Down a Baal Altar

²⁵ On that very night the Lord said to him, "Take your father's young bull and a second bull seven years old. Then tear down the altar of Baal that belongs to your father and cut down the Asherah pole beside it. ²⁶ Build a well-constructed altar to the Lord your God on the top of this rock. Take the second bull and offer it as a burnt offering with the wood of the Asherah pole you cut down." ²⁷ So Gideon took 10 of his male servants and did as the Lord had told him. But because he was too afraid of his father's household and the men of the city to do it in the daytime, he did it at night. ²⁸ When the men of the city got up in the morning, they found Baal's altar torn down, the Asherah pole beside it cut down, and the second bull offered up on the altar that had been built. ²⁹ They said to each other, "Who did this?" After they made a thorough investigation, they said, "Gideon son of Joash did it."

³⁰ Then the men of the city said to Joash, "Bring out your son. He must die, because he tore down Baal's altar and cut down the Asherah pole beside it."

³¹ But Joash said to all who stood against him, "Would you plead Baal's case for him? Would you save him? Whoever pleads his case will be put to death by morning! If he is a god, let him plead his own case because someone tore down his altar." ³² That day, Gideon's father called him Jerubbaal, saying, "Let Baal plead his case with him," because he tore down his altar.

Gideon looks for reassurance & God answers as He sees Gideon's personality

The Sign of the Fleece

³³ All the Midianites, Amalekites, and Qedemites gathered together, crossed over the Jordan, and camped in the Valley of Jezreel.

³⁴ The Spirit of the Lord took control of Gideon, and he blew the ram's horn and the Abiezrites rallied behind him. ³⁵ He sent messengers throughout all of Manasseh, who rallied behind him. He also sent messengers throughout Asher, Zebulun, and Naphtali, who also came to meet him.

³⁶ Then Gideon said to God, "If You will deliver Israel by my hand, as You said, ³⁷ I will put a **fleece** of wool here on the threshing floor. If dew is only on the fleece, and all the ground is dry, I will know that You will deliver Israel by my strength, as You said." ³⁸ And that is what happened. When he got up early in the morning, he squeezed the fleece and wrung dew out of it, filling a bowl with water.

³⁹ Gideon then said to God, "Don't be angry with me; let me speak one more time. Please allow me to make one more test with the fleece. Let it remain dry, and the dew be all over the ground." ⁴⁰ That night God did as Gideon requested: only the fleece was dry, and dew was all over the ground.

Judges 7:1-8

God pars down an army of 32,000 to 300 so EVERYONE will know God has delivered Israel.

Reassurance again: Take your servant



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⁹ That night the Lord said to him, "Get up and go into the camp, for I have given it into your hand. ¹⁰ But if you are afraid to go to the camp, go with Purah your servant. ¹¹ Listen to what they say, and then you will be strengthened to go to the camp." So he went with Purah his servant to the outpost of the troops^[d] who were in the camp. ¹² Now the Midianites, Amalekites, and all the Qedemites had settled down in the valley like a swarm of locusts, and their camels were as innumerable as the sand on the seashore. ¹³ When Gideon arrived, there was a man telling his friend about a dream. He said, "Listen, I had a dream: a loaf of barley bread came tumbling into the Midianite camp, struck a tent, and it fell. The loaf turned the tent upside down so that it collapsed."

¹⁴ His friend answered: "This is nothing less than the sword of Gideon son of Joash, the Israelite. God has handed the entire Midianite camp over to him."

- Gideon was a called Judge who refused to be anointed as King (Judges 8:22-23).
- ²² Then the Israelites said to Gideon, "Rule over us, you as well as your sons and your grandsons, for you delivered us from the power of Midian."
- ²³ But Gideon said to them, "I will not rule over you, and my son will not rule over you; the Lord will rule over you."

Judges 8:28-33

²⁸ So Midian was subdued before the Israelites, and they were no longer a threat. ^[h] The land was peaceful 40 years during the days of Gideon. ²⁹ Jerubbaal (that is, Gideon) son of Joash went back to live at his house. ³⁰ Gideon had 70 sons, his own offspring, since he had many wives. ³¹ His concubine who was in Shechem also bore him a son, and he named him Abimelech. ³² Then Gideon son of Joash died at a ripe old age and was buried in the tomb of his father Joash in Ophrah of the Abiezrites.

³³ When Gideon died, the Israelites turned and prostituted themselves with the Baals and made Baal-berith^[] their god. ³⁴ The Israelites did not remember the Lord their God who had delivered them from the power of the enemies around them. ³⁵ They did not show kindness to the house of Jerubbaal (that is, Gideon) for all the good he had done for Israel.

Judges 9:1-2

Abimelech son of Jerubbaal went to his mother's brothers at Shechem and spoke to them and to all his maternal grandfather's clan, saying, ² "Please speak in the presence of all the lords of Shechem, 'Is it better for you that 70 men, all the sons of Jerubbaal, rule over you or that one man rule over you?' Remember that I am your own flesh and blood."

³ His mother's relatives spoke all these words about him in the presence of all the lords of Shechem, and they were favorable to Abimelech, for they said, "He is our brother." ⁴ So they gave him 70 pieces of silver from the temple of Baal-berith. ^[b] Abimelech hired worthless and reckless men with this money, and they followed him. ⁵ He went to his father's house in Ophrah and killed his 70 brothers, the sons of Jerubbaal, on top of a large stone. But Jotham, the youngest son of Jerubbaal, survived, because he hid himself. ⁶ Then all the lords of Shechem and of Beth-millo gathered together and proceeded to make Abimelech king at the oak of the pillar in Shechem.

Two Opinions on "Evil Spirit"

• Notes. 23 An evil spirit was used by God to judge Abimelech. God is not evil, but evil powers are subject to his control (cf. 1 Sa. 16:14; Jb. 1:12).

• 9:23 God sent a spirit that stirred up trouble. In contrast to the legitimate saviors of Israel, who were possessed by the Spirit of Yahweh, Abimelech the usurper received a kind of charisma of his own, lit. "God sent an evil spirit between Abimelech and the lords of Shechem." The term "evil" (ra' [7451, 8273]) embraces the entire semantic domain of trouble, calamity, mischief, and moral evil from the point of view of the person involved. It does not denote objective evil. For example, Joshua challenged his people, "If it is ra' in your eyes to serve Yahweh" (Josh 24:15). Clearly serving Yahweh is not a bad thing, but someone conceivably could perceive it as such. Thus God put a spirit between Abimelech and the Shechemites that caused bad feelings. The authenticating, loyalty-inspiring charisma of the divinely chosen leader had its dark counterpart. God had taken up the challenge implicit in Abimelech's repudiation of Gideon.²

The Hebrew term ra, translated as "evil" in the CSB, has a wide range of possible meanings ranging from misery to morally evil. The thought here could be something akin to Saul having a distressing or injurious spirit or disposition. Also, the Hebrew term b't, rendered "torment," could be used to refer to an emotion of extreme fear.³

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An Example in:

• 2 Thessalonians 2:1-12 The Great Apostasy

2 Now, brethren, ^(A)concerning the coming of our Lord Jesus Christ ^(B)and our gathering together to Him, we ask you, ² ^(C)not to be soon shaken in mind or troubled, either by spirit or by word or by letter, as if from us, as though the day of ^(A)Christ had come. ³ Let no one deceive you by any means; for that Day will not come ^(D)unless the falling away comes first, and ^(E)the man of ^(D)sin is revealed, ^(E)the son of perdition, ⁴ who opposes and ^(G)exalts himself ^(H)above all that is called God or that is worshiped, so that he sits ^(G)as God in the temple of God, showing himself that he is God.

1 Kings 22:19-23 (2 Chronicles 18:18-22)



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¹⁹ Then *Micaiah* said, "Therefore hear the word of the Lord: ©I saw the Lord sitting on His throne, ©and all the host of heaven standing by, on His right hand and on His left. ²⁰ And the Lord said, 'Who will persuade Ahab to go up, that he may fall at Ramoth Gilead?' So one spoke in this manner, and another spoke in that manner. ²¹ Then a spirit came forward and stood before the Lord, and said, 'I will persuade him.' ²² The Lord said to him, 'In what way?' 1 Kings 22:19-23 and 2 Chronicles 18:18-22: A Lying Spirit

The context for these passages is twofold—a meeting in heaven between Yahweh and "the whole heavenly army" and a meeting on earth between Ahab, Micaiah, and Ahab's false prophets. Micaiah reported to Ahab that he had a vision of a "lying spirit" that would entice the king into battle, where he would be killed. Ahab's prophets encouraged him to go into battle with assurance that he would be victorious.

The plot is Ahab, the king of Israel, attempting to form an alliance with Jehoshaphat, king of Judah, to attack Ramoth-gilead and seize it from Aramean control. Ahab, in response to Jehoshaphat's desire to seek the Lord before attacking Ramoth-gilead, summoned 400 of his pagan prophets, who predicted his victory. Jehoshaphat desired that they hear from a prophet of Yahweh. Ahab capitulated and sought Micaiah.

Micaiah described a vision in which he saw a heavenly gathering comparable to the one described in Job 1:6–12 and 2:1–6. In the divine council, Yahweh asked who would go and entice Ahab into battle, where he would be killed (1 Kgs 22:10). A spirit volunteered to go and become "a lying spirit" in the mouths of Ahab's prophets that would entice him into battle (v. 22). The lying spirit in Micaiah's vision was clearly understood to be an angelic being, for the setting is a heavenly assembly.



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It does not appear that the angelic being should be understood as Satan, for he is not specifically mentioned in the passage. The angelic figure, however, did have a conversation comparable to the one Satan had with God in Job 1–2. While the spirit is not specifically identified as an evil spirit, the main reason for understanding the angel/spirit to be evil is because of its evil function—it prompted Ahab's prophets to speak a false prophecy and deceive him into going into battle. Deception is commonly associated with Satan and his demons. The use of deception and the parallel to Job 1–2 suggest strongly that the spirit is evil.

Ahab was told the truth by a true prophet of God; however, when presented with the truth, Ahab chose the lie. The most troubling thought for many Christians is God's use of a lying spirit. Remember that God himself does not do evil, but he sometimes uses evil agents to accomplish his purposes.[????? NOT SURE I AGREE WITH THIS]

Ahab, not God, was responsible for rejecting the word of a true prophet and accepting the prophecy of false prophets. One of Ahab's own prophets taunted Micaiah, indicating that they could not both be right: "Then Zedekiah son of Chenaanah came up, hit Micaiah on the cheek, and demanded, 'Did the Spirit of the LORD leave me to speak to you?' " (1 Kgs 22:24; cf. 2 Chr 18:23). The passage asserts both the sovereignty of God over the affairs of earth and humanity's culpability for their sinful decisions. ⁴

4. 1 Chronicles 21: Satan Incites David

In Chronicles, Satan is depicted as inciting David to call for a census.

- Satan is not mentioned often in the Old Testament.
- When he does appear, he is the adversary of someone devoted to God (Job 1:6; 2:7; Zech 3:1–2; 1 Chr 21:1).
- The term "satan" is used often without the article in Hebrew $(\dot{s}\bar{a}t\bar{a}n)$ and usually refers to a human adversary or opponent (e.g., Num 22:22; Ps 109:6).
- When the Hebrew term appears with the article (*haśśāṭān*), as it does in Job 1–2 and Zech 3:1–2, it is used as a title (e.g., *the* Accuser).
- The word $\delta \bar{a}t\bar{a}n$ occurs in only three passages in the Old Testament as a specific reference to the devil: Job 1–2, Zech 3:1–2, and 1 Chr 21:1.

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• In Job and Zechariah, this individual is identified as "the Accuser" (NLT), and "satan" is not technically a proper name.

Zechariah 3:1-2

Then he showed me ^(A)Joshua the high priest standing before the Angel of the Lord, and ^(B)Satan^(Q) [ADVERSARY] standing at his right hand to oppose him. ² And the Lord said to Satan, ^(C) "The Lord rebuke you, Satan! The Lord who ^(D) has chosen Jerusalem rebuke you! ^(E) Is this not a brand plucked from the fire?" NKJV

• The word is used as a proper name (without the article) **for the first time in** 1 Chr 21:1, where David is incited by Satan to order a census of Israel. In Job 1–2 and Zech 3:1–2, the word refers to a member of the divine council. While śāṭān is not at this point a proper name in the biblical narrative, from a canonical perspective he can be understood as Satan or the devil (cf. Rev 12:9). The title later developed into a proper name just as the title Christ became a proper name for Jesus. ⁵

1 Chronicles 21:1

Now @Satan stood up against Israel, and moved David to @number Israel. NKJV

2 Samuel 24:1

Again ^(B)the anger of the Lord was aroused against Israel, and He moved David against them to say, ^(C) "Go, ^[a]number Israel and Judah." NKJV

• God's anger does what? It moves things in the natural world. How? Not sure.

It is best to understand 2 Samuel 24 to explain David's actions in terms of a primary cause (God's anger), while the 1 Chronicles passage explains David's actions in terms of a secondary cause, Satan. The term $\dot{s}\bar{a}t\bar{a}n$, translated "Satan" in 1 Chr 21:1, is used without the article; thus, it is a personal name and not just the title. In the Old Testament, a census was common (Num 1:2–47; 4:2–49; 26:2–65; 2 Chr 17:13–18; 25:5; 26:11–13). Those related to the monarchy normally have to do with military matters. Joab was opposed to David taking the census. David came to understand that he had sinned against God (1 Chr 21:8). In an unusual move, God allowed David a choice in the form of punishment that would befall Israel and David (vv. 10–14).

The passage indicates that Satan "incited" (swt) David, but he did not force David to take the census. David was culpable for his own sinful choice. The census was not against God's law, but his motive for the census—pride in his military prowess—may have been wrong. David forgot that his real strength came from God. Even Joab, not known for his godliness, recognized that it was a terrible decision. David's example teaches that an action in itself may not be wrong, but the action may be motivated by sin, such as pride, greed, or selfishness. Satan is depicted here as the tempter seeking to incite David to act in a way that demonstrated a lack of trust in God. Self-sufficiency pulls a person away from God. The parallel passage in 2 Sam 24:1 makes it clear that Satan would not have been able to cause trouble for David if God had not let him.⁶

5. Job 1-2: Satan and God's Servant

Oldest book in scripture.
Will always challenge **our** definition/expectations of God.
God is only truly understood in relationship.

Job 1:1-12

There was a man ^(A)in the land of Uz, whose name was ^(B)Job; and that man was ^(C)blameless and upright, and one who ^(D)feared God and ^(A)shunned evil. ² And seven sons and three daughters were born to him. ³ Also, his possessions were seven thousand sheep, three thousand camels, five hundred yoke of oxen, five hundred female donkeys, and a very large household, so that this man was the greatest of all the ^(D)people of the East.

⁴ And his sons would go and feast in their houses, each on his appointed day, and would send and invite their three sisters to eat and drink with them. ⁵ So it was, when the days of feasting had run their course, that Job would send and ^[G] sanctify them, and he would rise early in the morning ^(E) and offer burnt offerings according to the number of them all. For Job said, "It may be that my sons have sinned and ^(E) cursed ^[d] God in their hearts." Thus Job did regularly.

Satan Attacks Job's Character

⁶ Now ^(G) there was a day when the sons of God came to present themselves before the Lord, and ^{[e]THE} Satan also came among them. ⁷ And the Lord said to ^{[f]THE} Satan, "From where do you come?"

So THE Satan answered the Lord and said, "From $^{(\!\!\!\perp\!\!\!)}$ going to and fro on the earth, and from walking back and forth on it."

⁸ Then the Lord said to ^{THE}Satan, "Have you ^[g]considered My servant Job, that there is none like him on the earth, a blameless and upright man, one who fears God and ^[h]shuns evil?"

⁹ So ^{THE}Satan answered the Lord and said, "Does Job fear God for nothing? ¹⁰ Have You not ^{II} made a hedge around him, around his household, and around all that he has on every side? ^(I) You have blessed the work of his hands, and his possessions have increased in the land. ¹¹ ^(I) But now, stretch out Your hand and touch all that he has, and he will surely ^(I) curse ^(I) You to Your face!"

¹² And the Lord said to ^{™E}Satan, "Behold, all that he has is in your [™]power; only do not lay a hand on his person." So ^{™E}Satan went out from the presence of the Lord. NKJV



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Facts revealed about the Enemy:
